It's that time of the year where parents have to decide where to place their children for Kindergarten. For most 2nd year Montessori students (typically 4-5 years old), the basic foundation have been presented and it is in the 3rd year (5-6 Kindergarten age) when everything they have absorbed in their two years will begin to make sense. In the 3rd year of Montessori, you will notice spontaneous reading and writing develop further, math becomes more complex and abstract, and many more academic interests become more obvious. Most importantly, the 3rd year Montessori offers these students the opportunity of leadership in the classroom. They begin to teach other students and they become more confident individuals. There are many benefits to finishing the 3 year Montessori cycle. Presented in this Parent Information Day are the Kindergarten curriculum, benefits of the 3rd year Montessori program, and requirements. Elementary Information Day

This is a great opportunity for the parents of our current Kindergarten students to learn about the benefits of continuing with the Montessori system of education for the elementary level. If you have seen your child blossom and thrive during their Kindergarten year, just wait and see what they will learn in the elementary years. Elementary students are given the opportunity to explore subject matters such as history, chemistry, biology, botany, zoology, literature, to name a few. They use many tools for learning: such as doing research on a subject matter, reenacting a certain scenes in history or literature, performing numerous hands on activities or experiments, and using the Montessori Elementary materials as a guide to understanding an abstract concept. Our goal is for the child to have a deeper understanding of the subject matter and to make this information meaningful to them. Not only elementary students do well in academics, but they are well versed in different areas, such as, performing in front of an audience, helping their community, playing a musical instrument, conversing and writing in Spanish. Self-confidence and a love for learning become inherent. Motivation and goodness come from within, not through token rewards or a need of praise.

If you haven't set foot in the Elementary classroom, we invite parents of our current Kindergarteners, soon-to-be-1st graders, to attend and to learn more about the Montessori Elementary program. We will discuss the elementary curriculum, requirements, work, and many Montessori materials used in the classroom. WHAT ARE THE THREE LEVELS OF OBEDIENCE?

Obedience is seen something which develops in the child in much the same way as other aspects of his character. At first, it is dictated purely by the impulse, then it rises to the level of consciousness, and thereafter it goes developing stage by stage, till it comes under the control of the conscious will.

This first level of obedience is generally observed in children 3 and under, however, older children may also exhibit disobedience. "Before the child is three, he cannot obey unless the order he receives corresponds with one of his vital urges. He is still busy in the unconscious building up of the mechanisms needed by his own personality, and he has not yet reached the stage when these are so firmly founded that they can serve his wishes and be directed by him consciously." "Even after 3, the little child, must have developed certain qualities before he is able to obey. He cannot, all of a sudden, act in conformity with another person's will, nor can he grasp, from one day to the next, the reason for doing what we require of him." (Montessori, *The Absorbent Mind*, 1964)

"The second level is when the child can always obey, or rather, when there are no longer any obstacles deriving from his lack of control. His powers are now consolidated and can be directed not only by his own will, but by the will of another." (Montessori, *The Absorbent Mind*, 1964) This may appear to be the highest level of obedience; however, because it is dependent on outside variables (adults or authority figures), this is not true obedience or self-discipline. The child is merely satisfying someone else's wishes, not his own.

The third level of obedience is when the child "responds promptly and with enthusiasm and as he perfects himself in the exercise, he finds happiness in being able to obey." (Montessori, *The Discovery of the Child*, 1967) This is the stage of true self-discipline.
